Governor Pritzker's Goal:


Make Illinois the best state in which to raise a young family, with the nation's best early childhood system

Our Transformation Priority:

Provide equitable access to high-quality early childhood education and care services for all children birth to age five in Illinois



Like the Funding Commission, the ECTT is focusing on the Early Childhood Education & Care system, as one critical component of a comprehensive EC system




Our Priority Requires Transformation

Our current approach to funding ECEC programs is not producing equitable access to services.

The federal landscape is changing with the potential of the American Families Plan - and we have to prepare our system for transformative change directed and funded by Congress.

We need to build the funding approach that will produce equity, and then fund that approach.





The Funding Commission made bold recommendations to make our ECEC system simpler, better and fairer.



- To advance equity and quality, use a longterm funding goal in policy-making.
- To make sense of the system, coordinate ECEC funding.
- To make it easier for parents and providers, centralize ECEC programs into one state agency.

The Early Childhood Transformation Team is charged with leading the next steps toward these objectives.

Early Learning Council Racial Equity Definition

Adopted July 2018

- A racially equitable society values and embraces all racial/ethnic identities. In such a society, one's racial/ethnic identity (particularly Black, Latino, Indigenous, and Asian) is not a factor in an individual's ability to prosper.
- An early learning system that is racially equitable is driven by data and ensures that:
 - Every young child and family regardless of race, ethnicity, and social circumstance has everything s/he/they need to develop optimally;
 - Resources, opportunities, rewards, and burdens are fairly distributed across groups and communities so that those with the greatest challenges are adequately supported and not further disadvantaged; and
 - Systems and policies are designed, reframed, or eliminated to promote greater justice for children and families.

Early Learning Council Racial Equity Priorities

Adopted July 2019

- Align and standardize race/ethnicity data collection and reporting
- Evaluate and identify whether processes for distributing resources exacerbate racial disparities, including agency contracting
- Address racial/ethnic disparities in terms of workforce compensation and advancement
- Eliminate racial/ethnic disparities for children participating in all
 programs that contribute to school readiness and life success by
 addressing racial disparities in enrollment in preschool for 3- and 4-yearolds and in prenatal to age 3 services.

We are transforming Illinois' Early Childhood Education and Care system to:

Early Childhood Transformation Team

- Create local and regional community systems
- Compile and analyze racial, social, and geographic data on funding and high-quality access, providing information the state has never had for its funding policy decision-making
- Use this new data to ensure equitable distribution of existing and new funding, including federal relief dollars, child care rates, early childhood block grants
- Devise strategies for more timely, predictable funding for providers
- Structure provider contracts to tie quality standards to funding allocation
- Devise approaches to a centralized/coordinated funding allocation method for education and care services
- Advise on the coordination of interagency operations and authorities as funding allocation and distribution becomes more centralized
