

Investing in What Matters: Early Childhood Development


SMART START ILLINOIS: Investing in Early Childhood

Continued funding for the third year of the Governor's early childhood initiative

This multiyear program provides a comprehensive approach to investments in preparing children to be lifelong learners. Year 3 investments include:

- \$21.7 million in operational funding for the Illinois Department of Early Childhood.
- \$748 million to maintain investment in ISBE Early Childhood Block Grant funding.
- Approximately \$200 million investment in funding for nation-leading Early Childhood Workforce Compensation Contracts.
 - \$90 million increase to annualize the cost of the contracts and replace expired federal childcare funding.
- · Other Early Childhood Investments include:
 - \$85 million in additional investment to cover expected increased participation in the Child Care Assistance Program.
 - \$3.3 million to continue expansion of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.
 - Today, more 61,000 children under the age of five have been signed up to receive free books in the mail every month.
 - \$10 million to support rate enhancements for the Early Intervention service providers.



System or Policy Concern from Families	How Families View the Concern	Potential Ideas for Discussion
Complex system for young children and families that is difficult to navigate	Families are frustrated and the child may not get referred and/or receive services	 Co-design online, accessible portal that includes all early care and education programs and services and clear process for parents to navigate Fund local navigators to support parents in finding the appropriate services and navigating the process
Lack of consistent and accessible communication for families and practitioners	 Families are often unable to find and/or access information due to multiple locations for information, inconsistent language, use of acronyms, and/or translation in home language Families found that some practitioners (e.g., pediatricians) are not aware of programs, services, and supports to young children and families 	 Co-design online, accessible portal that includes all early care and education programs and services and clear process for parents to navigate Fund local navigators to support parents in finding the appropriate services and navigating the process


System or Policy Concern from Families	How Families View the Concern	Potential Ideas for Discussion
Long waiting lists for families	 Families that know about Early Intervention may not receive services because of the long waiting lists 	 Identify additional funding to address disparities in access
Lack of professional development (training and technical assistance) available to all early care and education programs that supports the diverse needs of all children and families	 Families believe there is a lack of knowledge about referrals and supporting children with disabilities, particularly those who need more intense behavior supports or medical care Families identified the need for flexibility in service delivery that ensures continuity of care while working towards IFSP goals Families believe alignment and coordination between Early Intervention, Home Visiting, health care system, and child care are needed to support the child and family 	 Prepare field for "no wrong door" policy for screening and referrals Explore cross-sector professional development, including pre and inservice requirements, for those working with children and families

Delayed background check process	 Families are concerned that therapists may not be able to provide services in natural environment (e.g., child care) 	Explore options for streamlined background check process
Potential financial strain of early care and education programs and services	 Families are struggling to pay for services and child care (if services are privately paid for by family) Families struggle to navigate insurance approvals 	 Explore automatic child care subsidy eligibility and potential for increase in CCAP reimbursement rates for children who are receiving Early Intervention services

Developmental Support Services-Birth to 3

Co-Design System Proposal "Sprint"

February 7, 2025

Goal: Design ways to increase access to and participation in essential 0-3 services for families with young children with special needs, differentiated by region and community assets and needs. Equitable access and participation in 0-3 services will increase family and child autonomy, decrease reliance on state services (e.g., fewer students will need more intensive intervention and supports later in school if we are able to provide needed developmental supports early), and increase dependability of the state.

Approach: Over the next 12 months, in partnership with DHS, IDEC will assemble a team of partners to create implement a "co-design sprint" to develop a strategic plan for 0-3 services for families with young children with special needs. Over the next 6-9 months, this will include:

- engaging 2-3 regional communities in a co-design, human centered process to design better approaches to information access and participation models for 0-3 services.
- conducting a deep dive with the field, DHS, HFS and other legacy agencies, to map the
 current state of 0-3 services, with a focus on Early Intervention (including how it
 intersects with Home Visiting), to explore how to map the current opportunities and
 by leveraging the engagement and analytical support of the IDEC transition
 workstreams.
- . mapping how to get from the current state to the desired future state.

The TAC and Workgroup on Families with Children with Special needs will get monthly updates on the work. The Illinois Interagency Council on Early Intervention (IICEI) will receive quarterly updates on the work.

What does success look like?

- IDEC is able to create a package of policy and system changes that: a) address the
 regional and racial disparities that persist in access to high quality services and supports
 enabling more families, particularly black and rural families, (inclusive of linguistic
 diversity) to receive services in their setting of choice in a timely manner, and b) improve
 provider experience ensuring a strong and stable network of providers that reflect the
 diversity of Illinois' families.
- IDEC/IDHS is able to easily and effectively communicate eligibility and process for services and supports.
- IDEC has an approach to transition and more effectively bill Medicaid and private insurance for eligible services.
